Saladin Children's Trust Gives \$80,000 to Chicago Hospital

The Trustees of Saladin Shriners Children's Trust voted in October to make a gift of \$80,000 to the Chicago Shrine Hospital for two separate projects. \$50,000 will be used to digitize the research archive of Dr. Edward Miller. Dr. Miller served nearly his entire career as staff physician at the Chicago Hospital. His research and efforts continue to have a lasting effect on pediatric orthopaedic surgery throughout the Shrine system.

The remaining \$30,000 will be used to construct a leadlined room for lower extremity fluoroscopy within the existing hospital motion analysis lab.

Dr. Pernendu Gupta, Chicago Shriners Hospital's new Chief of Staff, was present at our October Ceremonial to speak about orthopedic care at the hospital and to accept the \$80,000 gift from Saladin's newest four nobles.

Greenville Hospital Patient Competes at Paralympics

Brian Bell is on a roll...one that has earned him a gold medal in wheelchair basketball at the Paralympic Games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. The 27-year-old Alabama native and father of three calls the games the biggest challenge of his career.

Bell lost his right leg in a train accident when he was just 10-years-old. Between the ages of 10 and 18, he came to Shriners Hospitals for Children — Greenville for treatment and prosthetic limb fittings and fabrication. At Shriners Hospitals for Children, the doctors and staff helped Bell to not only recover, but also try new activities. These activities included sports, such as football, which he played until he discovered wheelchair basketball at a training facility he frequented.

Bell fell in love with basketball and went on to win a gold medal in the World Championship in Birmingham, England, when he was just 16. He now plays professionally in Italy.

Bell is also studying kinesiology and hopes to become a personal trainer and basketball coach. He wants to give back to other young people who suddenly find themselves facing adversity, just like he did after his accident.

"I want to show others that you can still go on to do great things even if you have a disability," said Bell. "It can make you stronger and Shriners Hospitals for Children helped me see that."

Finding His Voice: Chicago Hospital Patient Cody Conroy

When Cody Conroy was born with a bilateral cleft lip and cleft palate, his mother wasn't sure where to turn for help. The hospital near their Rapid City, South Dakota, home did not have the specialists onsite to perform the surgeries or offer the follow-up care Cody needed. So, until age 9, Cody's speech was extremely delayed.

"I did not like talking to or being around people. I was very shy and aware of my speech condition, and it was hard," said Cody.

Working as a hairdresser, Cody's mother had a client who asked about her son's condition. She went on to say that she knew Shriners Hospitals for Children — Chicago had an excellent cleft lip and palate and plastic surgery team, and the Conroys soon booked an appointment.

Cody underwent several surgeries at the hospital, including a bone graft

surgery to repair his cleft palate; and reconstructive surgery on his nose, teeth and mouth. He followed up with speech therapy at home and school and was soon speaking very clearly – for the first time in his life. "I never thought I would speak normally or that my condition would get better," said Cody. "And wow, it sure did."

The multidisciplinary plastics team at the Chicago Shriners Hospital includes speech language pathologists, audiologists, plastic surgeons, orthodontists, nurses and nurse practitioners, care coordinators, ENT surgeons and more. The goal is to look at the needs of the child in their entirety and offer a treatment plan that is individualized for each patient, which is what Cody says he is grateful for.

"My advice to any child in my situation is for them to know that it will get better, and the people at Shriners



Hospitals for Children can help. They do excellent, excellent work, and I'm thankful for how they've changed my life."

Shriners Patient Wows Professional Golfers in Vegas

Five-year-old Tommy Morrissey is inspiring millions with his "no limits" attitude.

The golf prodigy and young patient of Shriners Hospitals for Children is the first child with a limb difference to qualify for the U.S. Kids Golf World Championship. Now in its 17th year, the championship is the largest and most prestigious event for competitive golfers ages 12 and under, drawing competitors from 50 countries. The event took place Aug. 4–6 in Pinehurst, North Carolina.

Tommy was born without a right forearm. His parents, Joe and Marcia Morrissey, both enjoy playing golf, and Tommy showed his affinity for the sport at a very young age, preferring videos of the PGA TOUR's finest to animated children's programs. He received his first set of clubs when he was only 18 months old. Since age 3, Tommy's enthusiasm for both life and golf has led to opportunities to interact with and receive lessons from some of golf's greatest players and attend numerous PGA TOUR events, including the 2015 PGA Championship. Through media events, like being on The Ellen DeGeneres Show, Tommy has demonstrated his skills and determination, while his parents emphasize their focus on what he can do, not what he can't. Concerned about the potential for Tommy, and other children, to be bullied, Tommy's parents also hope that his example of resilience will change attitudes toward children with disabilities and inspire all children to chase their dreams.

The Morrissey family has relied on the expert specialty care of Shriners Hospitals for Children since Tommy was 4 months old, especially the leadership of Scott Kozin, M.D., chief of staff of Shriners Hospitals for Children — Philadelphia, a renowned expert in pediatric upper extremity conditions.

"Tommy has been a patient of Shriners Hospitals for Chil-

dren since he was an infant. His family is loving and supportive with regard to his aspirations and goals. Tommy has worked hard to become a phenomenon in golf and the first child with a limb deficiency to qualify and compete for the championship," said Dr. Kozin. "The team at Shriners Hospitals for Children has worked with Tommy and his family to optimize his strength and balance to maximize his golf swing. Strengthening his shortened right upper extremity and maximizing his core strength have been the major emphasis to ensure balance and power. Tommy has become a mentor for other children with limb differences. His determination and drive is an example of the accomplishments possible for children with these conditions, provided they have the backbone of a supportive family and Shriners Hospitals for Children."

Whether a child's limb deficiency is present at birth (congenital) or the result of an accident or disease (acquired), it is important to get the right care as soon as possible. Shriners Hospitals for Children offers innovative and advanced treatment options combined with the expertise of multidisciplinary teams. The health care system, which has 22 locations in three countries, has provided care to thousands of children with limb differences.

Tommy was featured this year at the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open in Las Vegas, Nevada, which was held Oct. 31 – Nov. 6 at TPC Summerlin. Tommy and his parents shared lessons in life and golf with children from the community, other Shriners Hospitals for Children patients and several of the PGA TOUR professionals participating in the event.

"Tommy epitomizes much of what we see in so many patients of Shriners Hospitals for Children: strength, determination, and perseverance," said Adam Sperling, executive director of the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open. Showcasing those positive traits through the game of golf makes his presence at the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open the perfect opportunity to raise awareness for our system and for those that it serves."

National Patient Ambassadors

Every year, Shriners Hospitals for Children selects two National Patient Ambassadors to represent the health care system's patients. The ambassadors spend the year telling their stories of perseverance in the face of adversity and the ways Shriners Hospitals for Children has made a dramatic, life-changing difference in their lives. Here are our two new ambassadors:



Marius Woodward

Marius Woodward

Marius Woodward was born in a small village in Romania. The youngest of three children, he was a happy boy who loved playing soccer and running around his family's farm.

Everything changed in 2007, when the family's house caught on fire. After spending the night in the hospital, 8-year-old Marius learned that both of his parents had perished in the accident. Luckily, his siblings had not been home at the time and were fine. Marius also quickly discovered that the fire had taken all of his fingers and nose and left him with severe burns on more than 75 percent of his body.

Two months into his eight-month hospital stay, Ashley Ludlow and Jessica Free, two students from Brigham Young University who were participating in a special program, visited the hospital and met Marius. After hearing his story, the students, who understood that in Romania, Marius would be unable to get all the care he needed for an adequate recovery, asked their parents to help find a way to bring Marius to the U.S.

The first order of business was to find an organization that would commit to performing Marius' needed surgeries and taking care of the burn injuries and resultant scarring. Once the families found Shriners Hospitals for Children and knew Marius would be taken care of medically, they felt much better about bringing the boy to this country.

Ultimately, all the complicated pieces came together and Marius, together with his brother, Ionut, who was acting as Marius' legal guardian, arrived in Los Angeles in August 2008.

WORKING TOWARD INDEPENDENCE

After recuperating at Jessica's family home in Arizona for about a year, Marius moved in with Ashley's family in California to begin his treatment at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Los Angeles. The team that operated on Marius included Katherine Au, M.D., and Neil Jones, M.D., both pediatric plastic surgeons and hand surgeons at the hospital.

After Marius had surgery on his eyelids to prevent him from losing his sight, and additional surgery to reduce and improve the effects of residual scarring, he began a lengthy and revolutionary procedure to reconstruct his nose. The process, which was ultimately successful, took approximately three months and involved transferring cartilage from his ribs and skin from his scalp.

Because Marius had lost all of his fingers, he was unable to feed himself. He felt that this was one of the most important daily living skills that he needed to regain. The Shriners Hospitals for Children — Los Angeles surgical team suggested toe-to-hand transfer surgery. Determined to live as independently as possible, Marius agreed to the surgery, and Dr. Jones transferred six toes to his hands, which gave Marius the opportunity to become more independent. That ground-breaking surgery is believed to be the only one of that magnitude ever done.

In 2011, after three years in the U.S., Marius was legally adopted by the Woodward family.

GETTING STRONGER EVERY DAY

Today, Marius is an active 17-year-old high school student who, despite having only two toes and six fingers, plays football and soccer. His goal is to become a motivational speaker and a model, to demonstrate acceptance of his appearance and of who he is. "You don't need to see yourself as a different person but as a new person," Marius said. Marius is grateful for the role Shriners Hospitals for Children has had in his life. He is looking forward to the opportunities that being a National Patient Ambassador will provide to help raise awareness of the state-of-the-art medical care offered throughout our health care system.

Karolina Nogues

Karolina Nogues of Louisiana is the youngest of three siblings, and while oftentimes quiet, her caring personality does not go unnoticed.

UNEXPECTED NEWS

An ultrasound during pregnancy revealed that Karolina would be born with some abnormalities. The situation seemed grave enough that her parents, Chris and Cheryl Nogues, were given the option of terminating the pregnancy. The Nogues' made it clear that this would be something they would work through, no matter the situation.

Karolina was born in May 2000. The abnormality turned out to be a significant length discrepancy on one leg. After numerous visits to physicians, the Nogues family was advised to either amputate or lengthen Karolina's limb. The family decided they wanted to undergo a lengthening process but wanted it done in a place that had expertise in this field and would be able to provide all the necessary treatment, care and support.

Until age 5, Karolina wore a lift that helped compensate for the difference. The family was still searching for the right solution for Karolina's long-term treatment. One day, they heard about a Shriners Hospitals for Children — Shreveport Outreach Clinic and decided to attend. Physicians evaluated Karolina and took down some information. Later the family received a phone call, and the appointment for Karolina's first visit was scheduled.

WORKING THROUGH ROADBLOCKS

Unfortunately, Hurricane Katrina hit the area and caused tremendous upheaval for the Nogues family. Karolina missed her appointment, the family lost their house and belongings, and Karolina's mother lost her job. Finally, nine months later, they were ready and able to reschedule that appointment.

"Once we got there, everything felt right," Cheryl said. "We knew we were in the right place and where we needed to be, and we have been there ever since."

Karolina proved to be an excellent candidate for limb lengthening, which involves surgeries and the use of an external fixator that is attached to the leg and lengthens the bone incrementally. It is a slow, tedious and painful process. Karolina had her first surgery, followed by her first external fixator attached, when she was 7 years old. The repetitive treatment continued over the next nine years, eventually resulting in a 7-inch gain in length.

Karolina, now 16, is committed to making the most of her abilities. She rides horses and surfs, loves art and is passionate about the French culture and language. She plans to apply to a Disney program for animation.

Karolina and the entire Nogues family is especially grateful for the staff at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Shreveport and cannot emphasize enough how appreciative they are of every visit, every surgery, every phone call and all the countless efforts – large and small – that have made Shriners Hospitals for Children so special to them.

End of Year packets out to all Clubs and Units


